Alan Bryman's book Social Research Methods is an excellent introduction to research methods. It's available from The University of Edinburgh library, but you can pick up an inexpensive second-hand copy (there are many editions available).

Vries, RD. (2018). Critical Statistics: Seeing Beyond the Headlines. London: Bloomsbury Publishing is an entertaining and engaging read, accessible to non-expert statisticians (again, it's available in our University library, but second-hand copies are inexpensive).

The "Glasgow effect" (referring to the higher rates of early deaths in Scotland's second city) is a fascinating example of how the interaction of population demographics and behaviour, context such as deprivation and economic opportunity, and policy decisions including urban regeneration and wholesale relocation of communities, contributes to a wicked problem with a misleading name.
